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Is Creation Without God a Fool's Errand?

Did you hear the news? New images from the James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) have come back and critics of the Big Bang Theory are celebrating. Why? Because they now have more evidence to back their claims of being right! I'm not much of a cosmologist, but I do understand the ego-inflating joy of being right, and nothing makes us feel more right than having some empirical data to back up our theories. In this case they found that distant galaxies are not the size, shape or proximity from each other that should be the case if we actually had a big bang. This of course means that they seem to be right about their claim that the universe was not created by a "big bang."

This news got me to research more about the Big Bang theory, and as it turns out critics of the theory have been jumping up and down for years saying that it isn't correct, which was news to me as I thought the scientific community was pretty settled on it being more than just a theory. Apparently not. From what I've gathered the Big Bang theory does solve three issues: the expansion of the universe, the Cosmic Microwave Background, and the Big Bang Nucleosynthesis.

However there are problems with the Big Bang theory that have actually been known for years. I won't break your brain - or mine - by getting into explanations of the "initial density perturbation," "flatness problem," "horizon problem," or "monopole problem," but suffice it to say there are things that have been observed and/or predicted in the cosmos that run contrary to the way things should be if in fact the Big Bang theory is true. That these problems have been known for quite some time is rather vexing to the scientists who see the Big Bang theory continually promoted as a viable theory much the way Swedenborgians recoil at the theory that faith alone can bring about salvation.

Due to technological limitations, the church has had a hard time getting photographs from the afterlife that show there are people in hell who nonetheless believed that Jesus died on the cross for their sins, but thanks to the JWST, cosmologists don't have such constraints to prove their point these days. While I'm always glad to see science improve itself by moving past and discarding old theories that prove to be untrue, I'm still waiting for the day when it isn't just one materialistic theory being replaced for another. Realizing a theory is wrong is one thing, but it is a totally different endeavour to actually come up with the *right* answer!

So how do we get the right answer? Well, Swedenborg actually writes a fair bit about the creation of the universe, and it's actually closer to the Genesis account than perhaps you realize. He lays out some essentials saying "...it is clear that, without knowledge beforehand of the spiritual world and its Sun, and about correspondence, the creation of the

universe by the one infinite God cannot be comprehended at all; and it is due to this that there have appeared hypotheses, based upon naturalism, about the creation of the universe, that are foolish" (Canons 7). For the casual reader, it may seem that Swedenborg is being a bit arrogant calling others "foolish," but the fact is it is a reference to his own pretheological scientific works that tried to understand the universe but didn't account for God, a spiritual sun and correspondences... so he's including his own prior endeavours as "foolish." Essentially he's warning us all not to make the same mistakes he did.

That we need to have God in the equation is probably the most obvious. Theories on the origin of the universe always run into a problem of turning back the clock to some starting point, but are still stuck with the questions of, "Well, what was before this? Where did this stuff come from to start with?" Good questions, because you can't have something from nothing, so everything starts from something, and that something gets traced back to the Lord. He is the Alpha and Omega, you know, the beginning and the end, and for this article we can put emphasis on the *beginning*. So everything starts with Him. But what next?

I think the next question is, "What problem does a spiritual sun solve?" As I understand it, we are to understand that life, real life, comes to us through it. The spiritual sun is like a step down transformer. The Lord Himself is too powerful for us to be near, so we have to have something between Him and us. I think it helps to understand that the spiritual sun isn't an object that is separate from the Lord, rather "It is the emanating Divine love and wisdom which appear as the sun in that world" (DLW 86). It is in this emanation that all of the spiritual world receives life, which passes through the spiritual and into the natural. I think what we're supposed to take from this idea is that the entire spiritual world has life from this sun in a similar way that nature in our world has life from the sun of the physical world.

But just putting an "emanation" of life out there doesn't actually create anything. There has to be an intention. *True Christian Religion* says that the universe was created by Divine Truth, which would be a bit of a shock to Pilate who didn't even know what regular truth was, let alone Divine Truth.

We read:

Hardly anyone at this day knows that there is any power in truths; for truth is supposed to be nothing more than a statement uttered by someone in authority, which ought for that reason to be obeyed; thus truth is supposed to be like a mere breath from the mouth or sound in the ear; and yet truth and good are the principles of all things in both worlds, the spiritual and the natural; also they are the means by which the universe was created, and through which the universe is preserved, and the means as well by which man was created; therefore these two are the all in all things. (TCR 224)

So there you have it! The universe was created by a combination of the Lord emanating love, and speaking the universe into existence. Simple, right? I think there's actually more truth to the Genesis creation account than we give it credit for, but I don't think you'll find that in any cosmology text books any time soon. While this still feels pretty abstract to me,

I think the quote above makes us really re-think what truth is. The western, post-modern world sees truth as relative, and goes down the whole "my truth" versus "your truth" kind of thing, but that's not the picture we get here. The truth is like a rock! The truth isn't flexible, but is powerful, and it isn't just some abstract concept.

But there's one other essential element to creation that was mentioned in the *Canons* quote, and to me it is the key in all of this: it is the correspondential relationship between the two worlds. This world exists because the spiritual world exists. Because even if you believe that God exists, and the spiritual world exists, there's still that looming question of how does the natural world exist? The science of correspondences tells us that everything we see here is a reflection of some greater spiritual reality, and everything we see is a manifestation of that reality. How that works in mechanical terms, well, we aren't told that, but given that getting a passing grade for Calculus 3 in university was a struggle, my guess is that I wouldn't understand it even if I was told.

The spiritual basis of the universe is going to be the real ongoing problem for cosmologists, because they can send up all the telescopes and instruments they want into the vast reaches of space, but they're never going to find the spiritual. Sure, they can find evidence that allows them to see what the universe looked like in the past, but eventually they're going to run up against a wall because the universe is finite.

If you're managed to read this far, and you're not feeling like you've got this whole "creation of the universe" idea locked down, well, don't feel bad. The Writings tell us that we have to think outside of time and space to really understand it, and I don't know about you, but that's not what I do best. I don't think cosmologists are likely to do it well either, so while they can celebrate the images of the JWST, they're probably going to have to suffer through some more theories that will be eventually proven wrong until they come to the conclusion that materialist theories have their inherent limitations, and so long as they continue without an Alpha, a spiritual world, and a correspondential link, it is going to be a fool's errand.

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The Eagle and the Crow

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What Was God Doing Before the Creation of the Universe?

In my research for the lead article, I came across an interesting quote in the *Arcana* (8325) that I thought I'd share with you. It warns about the problems of contemplating what the Lord was doing before the creation of the universe, but what in particular jumped out at me were these markers at the edge of the universe, markers that eat us when we think about this stuff! I find the concept of an edge of the universe fascinating, but statues that eat us just is too strange to not share around. Enjoy.

For example, a natural man inevitably falls into a nonsensical way of thinking about God when with notions involving the passage of time he contemplates what God was doing before the creation of the world, that is, what He was engaged in from eternity up to then. Nor can he be extricated from that tangled knot until notions of time and space are banished. When

angels contemplate that eternity they never do so with notions of time but with ideas of state.

In the next life two statues appear, partly of flesh and partly of stone. They are stationed on the edge of the created universe, in front over to the left. They are said to swallow up those who contemplate what God was doing from eternity before He created the world. The swallowing up represents the consideration that since a person cannot contemplate anything without notions involving space and time he cannot extricate himself from the difficulty unaided. He does so only with the aid of God, either by ceasing to contemplate the matter or by banishing notions involving time.
