Swedenborg Was Right! Inhabitants on the Moon!

It would have been July of 1969 and people around the world were probably getting pretty excited because the Apollo 11 mission was going to put a man on the moon. But the New Church folks would have been particularly excited because this would be the mission that would provide the proof that Swedenborg was right: there are inhabitants on the moon. The story I've heard is that Rev Doug Taylor was promoting this idea, and was confronted by a reporter

when moon-men weren't found. He responded by saying, "They haven't been found *yet*."

When people have told me of Rev Taylor's response, I've always appreciated his conviction, and yet just kind of laughed it off because, well, there aren't people on the moon. They haven't found *anything* living on the moon, not even some bacteria or single celled organism, and not only that, no evidence of life *ever* existing there... so case closed, right? The Writings are wrong, no people on the moon. This, as you might imagine, does create a stumbling block for some people who are new to Swedenborg.

Since the moon landing, New Church scholars have been looking for a way to claim that 1) the Writings are an infallible revelation from God and 2) *Earths in the Universe* is true, so that point number 1 can actually stand. You've probably heard the ideas before... some will say that these people *used* to live there, or more commonly they'll point out that Swedenborg encountered *spirits* from the moon. For example:

"Some <u>spirits</u> appeared overhead, and I heard from there voices like thunder; for their voices thundered just like the claps of thunder which come from the clouds following lightning flashes... Their faces were not unattractive in appearance, but longer than those of other <u>spirits</u>. In height they resembled a boy of seven, but were stronger in body; so they were dwarfs. I was told by angels that they were from the moon" (EU 111, *emphasis added*).

The problem with this line of reasoning is that Swedenborg is clear that there are people who live on the moon. When you get to the

aforementioned *Earths in the Universe* #111, the first thing you read is a heading that states: "ON THE SPIRITS AND INHABITANTS OF THE MOON." Spirits *AND* inhabitants!

I thought that I had solved this problem, and wrote about it in the April 2021 issue of our newsletter, with an article titled "Space, Science & the Death of Imagination". My solution was that there are beings there, right now, but that they just live on a plane of existence that we can't see. You might describe it as living on a higher frequency. I've been pretty happy with this explanation, but have found that others don't find it as compelling as I do.

As you might imagine, this whole issue is really a fun, hobby-type question that sits on the back-burner for me, but in the last few months I've bumped into some stories in the news that have me wondering if, in fact, Swedenborg was right and there really are beings on the moon, and other planets too. Now, in order to get to this place, you're probably going to have to go out of your comfort zone. Honestly, it's a bit of a reach for me too, but the goal is to seek the truth, and sometimes that requires that we play around with some ideas that are unconventional.

So where this all started for me was a few months ago when a man named David Grusch did an interview as a means to get attention so that he could testify before the US Congress about government programs that were happening outside of congressional oversight. There really shouldn't be programs outside of congressional oversight, and he believes that the US government is in possession of UAPs [aka UFOs], based on his interviews with 40 witnesses over

four years. Grusch claimed, in response to congressional questions that the US has retrieved "non-human" biological matter from the pilots of the crafts and that this "was the assessment of people with direct knowledge on the [UAP] program I talked to, that are currently still on the program".

To me, what makes Grusch's claims so credible is that he willingly testified under oath to Congress about it. He's been very careful about what he says publicly because a lot of the information is classified, and it would be a crime to reveal it. It just leaves me feeling like he really must have something. In fairness, he hasn't claimed there to be life on the moon, but if his claims are true, then it brings into question just how much we can trust what the US government has said on this issue.

The next story to come out was an interview with Tucker Carlson, who, after being fired by Fox News, was able to say whatever he wanted without being censored or scripted by his superiors. He then goes on a podcast interview and says:

"There's a lot of evidence these things are coming out of the ocean, including videotape of these objects coming out of the water at high speed or even more amazing descending at Mach 3 into the water... then we have a huge submarine fleet – American, but also Chinese and Russian - underwater with pretty sensitive measurement devices sonar, etc., and they have recorded these objects doing hundreds of knots underwater.

"So let's just stop there... things are moving at impossibly high speeds so just like let's just apply common sense for one second. If

I take a 45 caliber handgun and fire it at you underwater in a swimming pool 50 feet away you can catch the bullet because the resistance is so strong from the water that objects can't move that fast underwater. We know that, but they are and they're moving without any visible means of propulsion, so no wake, no bubbles. We tracked that all over the world on like sonar systems and some of this is in the New York Times."

I've heard about underwater UFOs before, but if you listen to the whole interview you get the sense that in Carlson's perspective, the underwater UFOs are actually far more prevalent than the flying ones. In fact, this is why the US government has taken to calling them UAPs – unidentified anomalous phenomena – instead of UFOs.

At this point I acknowledge that nothing I've shown so far says anything about life on the moon. That's where the next story comes into play. The previous stories, to me, are still within my comfort zone. I think it's quite believable that the governments of the world would lie about this. But with this next story we're going to step right off the reservation into what many will consider a bridge too far, or simply "crazy town".

It starts with a man named Ingo Swann, who in 1998 claimed to be a psychic – yes, a psychic, but stay with me – who was previously employed by the CIA to remote-view the dark side of the moon. Specifically, he was hired to look for an alien presence. It sounds like science fiction, but in 2006, when the CIA started releasing documents on the Stargate project, Swann's participation in the

program was confirmed. When Swann was asked about the existence of extraterrestrials, he said not only were they already here, but they are building something on the far side of the moon. Later he came to the conclusion that they have a whole mining industry there, and that the UAPs we see here are on resupply missions because the aliens need water to continue their mining operation.

I told you we were going to go off the reservation! What makes Swann compelling though is that he has quite a documented history of being right. However, even he admits he's right only 65% of the time. But this particular idea about aliens on the moon was something that he saw multiple times, so even if you don't buy the mining operation, Swann's claim that there are aliens there has a stronger chance of being right. However, I like the alien mining colony idea because of how it meshes with all of the accounts of underwater UFOs, and Swann was saying this decades before underwater UFOs became talked about in UFO circles.

Of course, the message from our governments says that all of this is nonsense. So then it becomes a question of who do you believe? The Swedish mystic who claims revelation from God, or a government that has been known to not always tell the truth? In most circles the "mystic" has less credibility than the government, but should that be the case? The stories I've given here are just snapshots of the bigger picture. There's actually a lot more information out there about inhabitants on the moon and government covering it up than I had expected. Could there be something to it?

Swedenborg opens *Earths in the Universe* with a bit of philosophy, basically saying "All of these planets were made, how can they not have people on them?" He then says, "The planet Saturn, which is farthest from the Sun, has a huge luminous ring around it that gives a great deal of light to that planet, even though it is reflected light. Can any rational individual who knows all this maintain that these bodies are uninhabited?" (EU 3)

So at that point he's not saying he's seeing beings from Saturn, rather philosophically saying "How could there not be?" To that end, Swedenborg speaks to "inhabitants" of various planets in 62 out of 178 passages in *Earths in the Universe*, so I have a hard time buying the idea that he's just talking about spirits. He's writing about inhabitants. To be perfectly honest, I'm intellectually at peace with the prospect of planets without carbon-based life forms on them, and I prefer my original solution of beings that we can't see to the idea of aliens mining on the moon. However, I also feel like you go against Swedenborg at your own peril. And Swedenborg says there are inhabitants on the moon.

January Camp/Retreat Death & Resurrection

A couple of months ago it was announced that we were going to try to put on a family camp in the Blue Mountains during January 15-20, but as you may have heard by now, that plan has been scrapped. However, we're still looking to do *something* that weekend of January 20-21st. **Rev Howard Thompson** has his eyes on having something in Roseville, maybe a couple of sessions in the morning and couple in the afternoon on the 20th, maybe even

a guest speaker so you get a different voice than usual. Perhaps we'll even bribe you with some cinnamon scrolls. Much to be determined, but save that weekend for now.

"The good news is that through the dedicated, hard work of our task force and a core of supportive dorm families, we have developed a plan that modifies how we handle housing at ANC and continues to use the existing dormitory buildings. It is not a perfect plan, and it is currently designed as a bridge plan to meet the needs of our returning students and the students currently in the admissions pipeline. We will need to adapt the plan in the coming months and we do not know if it is reasonable to assume we can offer this housing model for the long term. But we are meeting the needs of our current families and continuing to investigate long-term viability. We remain committed to offering a New Church secondary school education for any student who wants what we provide."
