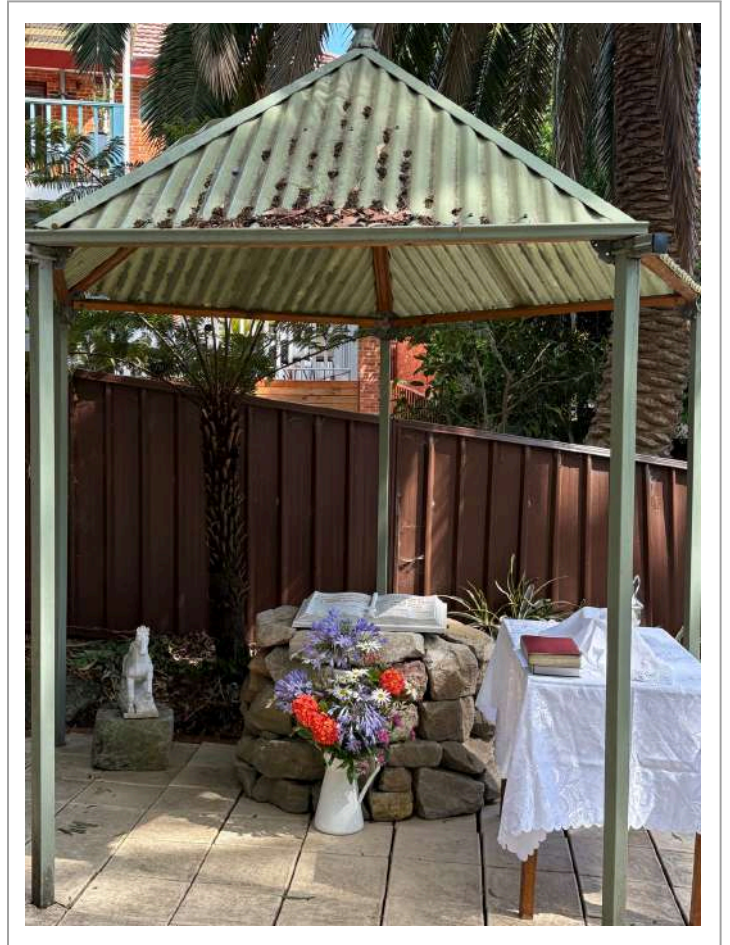

Garden Service on the First Sunday of the Year

It is our thing to have the first Sunday service of the year in the garden, and that was what we did on the 4th. There certainly was something special about it for some good reasons, probably the best one being that we were out there with the things of nature—the trees, grass, birds, sunshine, and others. It was certainly refreshing.

I hope that the topic for the service was as refreshing as our surroundings were. The topic we explored was ‘Own It for Yourself.’ We began the service by going over two stories from the Word: the story of Adam and Eve blaming others for their disobedience (Genesis 3), and the story of King David’s blindness to his own sin (2 Samuel 11, 12). Inherent in the stories was a message that we often look away from our own issue, rather than perceiving it as our accountability. In other words, we don’t own it but rather dump it on or blame it on others.



Does Blaming Help Us at All?

Sadly, I or we have seen or heard people blaming the whole world, their parents, their pastors, their family background, or pretty much everything else, for their unhappiness and even for their wrong choices.

While it is worthwhile examining what has influenced us or how other things helped shape who we are now, we can’t imagine our end goal being to think that we haven’t contributed to any of our difficulties or haven’t done a thing wrong.

And I suspect that we often leave out 'us' from our issues because "it can't be me or us" can feed us with a momentary relief of "O, I am not the culprit, and now I can put my finger on something else than myself." In fact, it can feel good to do so because it relieves us of our own burden and accountability. There comes a delight.

But I also suspect that such a relief is momentary and self-serving. And as a matter of fact, it doesn't help us, if we think about it. For one, there is no growth in it. And second, what else does it leave us with if we finger point at others but are blinded about ourselves? Since we've moved the focal point and our life's accountability from us to others, we end up being sorry and miserable for ourselves, rather than being encouraged and empowered towards what we are able to do for ourselves.

It Is Not Even About Blaming Ourselves

In the service, it was also addressed that it isn't either about blaming ourselves. We may even say that it is not even about blaming on anything at all levels. Blaming, which is different from seeking justice and holding someone rightly accountable for what they have actually done wrong, most of the time doesn't help.

Let's say we've failed our driving test. Some blame it on bad luck, thinking, "I was driving great but was unlucky because the examiner on the passenger seat didn't know what he or she was doing". Or we were driving drunk over the legal limit, got pulled over and caught. Some may think, "I was so close to getting away with it, if I didn't have the second glass, or if I'd driven in a different neighborhood." But some may blame themselves, beating on themselves, "how stupid I was, and I am so undone!" But all these are not necessary. Will any of these help us?

The way I picture 'owning it for ourselves' is that it is essentially about examining ourselves. It is an effort to find a fault(s) with us first, in the hope that we may learn something about ourselves, that we may be brought into an affection for a change, and that thus we may move forward. First, this is different from blaming ourselves. Also, it is not a 'blame game' of trying to

find faults with others. Instead, our end goal should be a better awareness of ourselves.

Rather, It Is About Ourselves—Ownership of and Accountability for Our Spiritual Life

Numerous teachings in the Word direct our attention to our part to do. They keep on calling us for our awareness, our choice, our determination, and our accountability.

The following passages are just a few of those teachings for our reflection here.

“Therefore, turn and live!” (Ezekiel 18:32)

“Therefore, whoever hears these sayings of Mine, and does them, I will liken him to a wise man who built his house on the rock. But everyone who hears these sayings of Mine, and does not do them, will be like a foolish man who built his house on the sand” (Matthew 7:24, 26)

“Choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve... but as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD.” (Joshua 24:15)

Reflecting on the Society’ Next Chapter

Our Sunday worship on the 11th was led by our guest minister, Bishop Peter Buss. Afterwards, we gathered at the Richard Morse Room for a potluck lunch, and most of us stayed on to visit with him for an hour session, where he presented ideas and snapshots of how some of the General Church congregations in the United States have been envisioning for their future.

At the meeting, Peter addressed a Scriptural phrase of “the book of Life” as in the book of Revelation. We could easily see how its concept would apply to the Society’s next chapter to write for the future to come—with the

question of how we can continue to write its unique story as a New Church congregation.



From here, you will also see my own reflection here and there. First off, in my mind, our underlying mission is manifest: we continue on providing people with worship services where the Lord and His teachings are placed at the centre. We continue to strive to be a congregation and a community that puts an emphasis on how to become a new person as the Lord's teachings invite so.

The beauty of Christian faith is people coming to see the presence of the Lord in the Word, the power of the Word, and how it can affect their lives. For the New Church, we can offer more. We can help people see how the Lord's Word can be illuminated by the teachings of the New Church or the Heavenly Doctrine, and how they together can help us in our daily lives. This may not be a 'new' chapter per se, but we can write our 'next' chapter in that direction.

As for reaching out to people with this mission beyond us individually, Peter spoke of one idea or a model, which resonated with me a lot. The idea is that Hurstville Society serves as a hub or a centre for people out there beyond the local area. This is also to say that our goal doesn't need to be filling the pews with a pack of people.

Working from within, But beyond Ourselves

For me, this was to say that while we work towards and long for people to join in person, we can also find ways to reach out to those who are out there.

Who can those be? Can't say anything specific, but we may say that it will be those who have the hope and faith that the Lord's Word has the wisdom to speak to them and inspire their life.

Trusting the Lord

How do we reach out to more people? We have limited resources and the means. What else or how else can we do? And I wonder what we need sometimes, if not most of the times, is our simple faith in the work of the Lord and in the power of the Lord's Word to bring, or bring His people back to His church. What we do, in the faith, is simply 'trying', 'inviting', and 'offering'. And we remain in prayer that the Lord's help is on the way, as long as we do the work, seek for His will to be done, and remember the Lord's teaching in Matthew 6:33.

“But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you.”

This may hardly be a clever manoeuvre in some people's view; Some may find it to be naïve. But I believe that this is what we do as children of God. We keep on trusting. We keep on trying. We keep on seeking His will, not ours, to be done, even when we have no answers and even when we don't get what we desire.

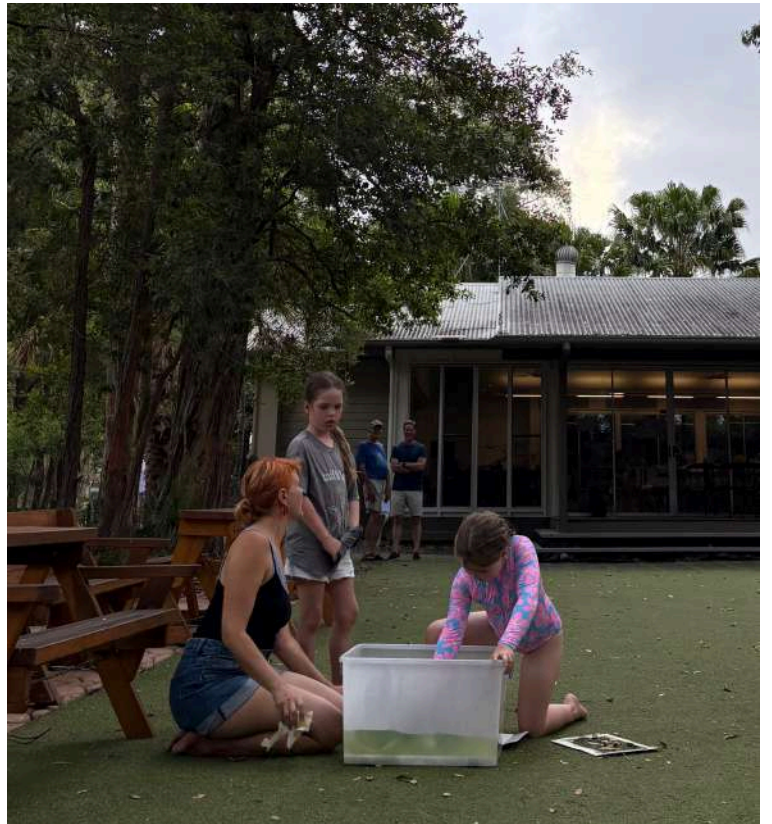

Plenty of Other Fun

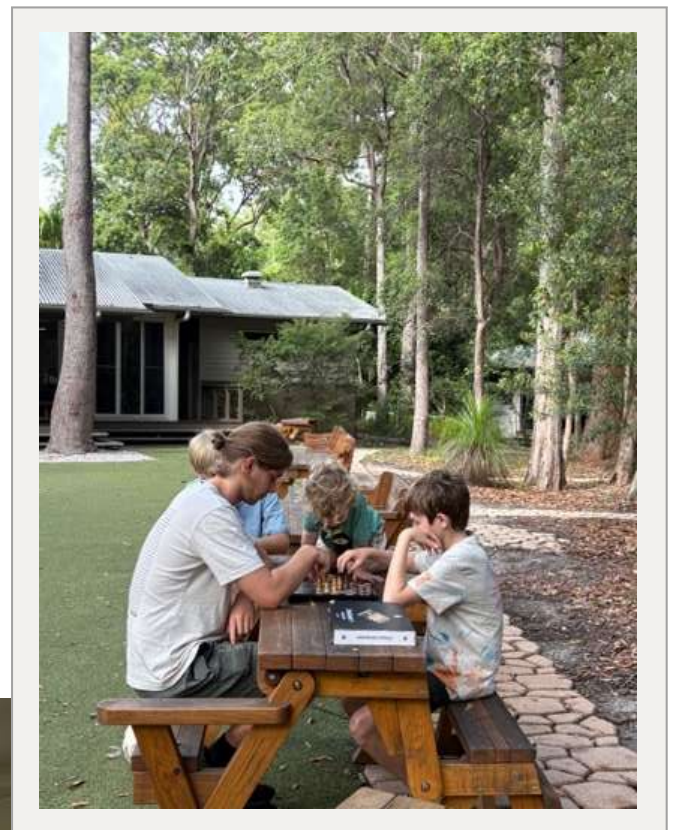

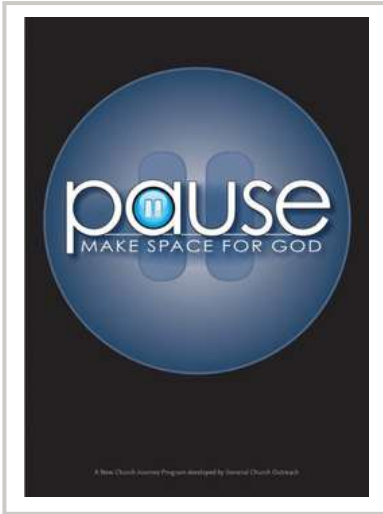








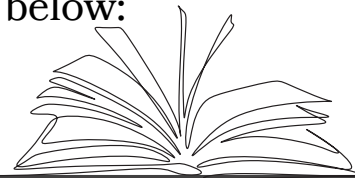
What's Coming Up?

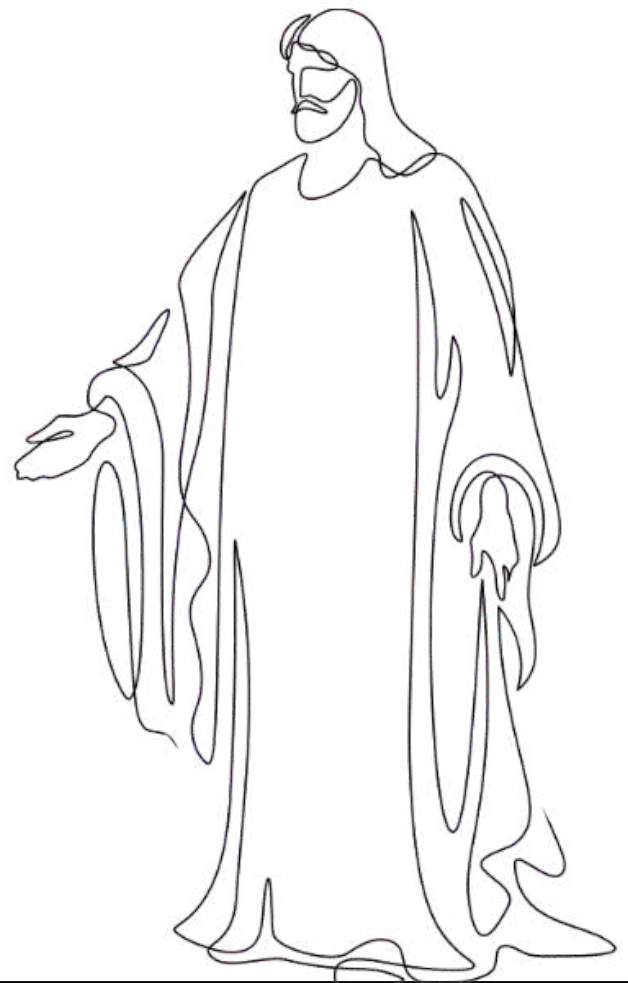
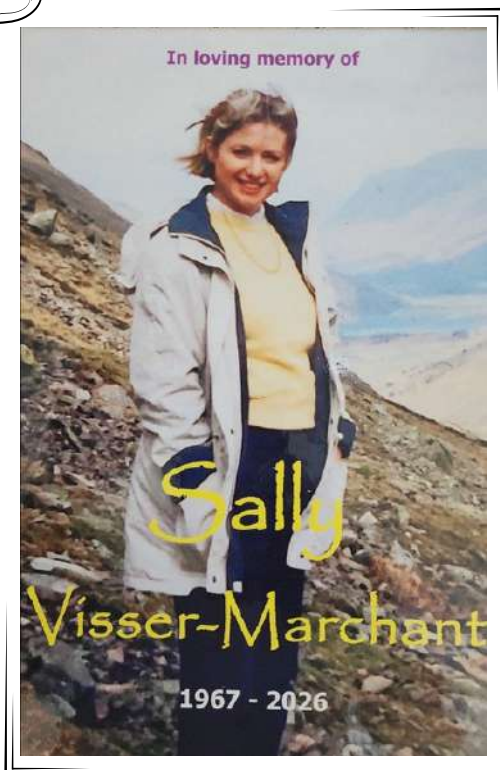
